In April 1965, the first particle board was produced at the new US Plywood plant in Gaylord. At the same time, with initiative and support from Plywood officials, a celebration was planned, a sistercity recommendation was made, and the City of Gaylord proclaimed itself the "Alpine Village."

Fred Fahmi, Zurich, Switzerland industrialist, holder of particle board patent rights, was invited to deliver to and receive documents from Pontresina naming the two towns sister cities.

Attending the first honors celebration focusing on U.S. Plywood and held in the plant itself were U.S. Plywood officials Warren C. Smith, John W. Churchill, S.W. Tony Antoville, Gene C. Brewer and Kenneth L. Morrow.

Others attending were Fahrni; Robert Geholtz, president of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, and Gov. George Romney.
