Shannon's success inspirational at GHS

Former teacher motivated his students with example of father of Information Theory

GAYLORD — The browning, faded newspapers and mimeo-graph sheets documenting the lives of Dr. Claude Shannon and Dr. Arthur Compton fold carefully under the fingers of former Gaylord science and math teacher Don Tarbutton. For 37 years, the inspirational reading material on Gaylord's two Nobel prize winners hung on a 4-foot-by-6-foot bulletin board in his

Though he was not responsi-ble for it, the placing of Dr. Shannon's bust in Gaylord's downtown park fit perfectly with Tarbutton's goal to inspire others to reach the same heights. Tarbutton fed that inspiration to almost 8 000 students with chalk dust by the spoonful.
"People don't know the histo-

ry of this town that shaped the orld," said Tarbutton, himself not a Gaylord native.

Tarbutton launches easily into

that history: Shannon's work on his capacity formula which describes computer memory, Compton's fateful meeting with Dr. Oppenheimer at Otsego Lake State Park to discuss further test-ing of the atomic bomb. Their actions drove Tarbutton to pursue his master's degree in physics and mathematics.

HE DROVE IT INTO his

charges.
"Look around you. You can feel it. It is pride. see. You can feel it. It is pride. I have always stressed pride in our school systems," he said. "In 1958 while teaching physics, chemistry and mathematics at Gaylord, it was brought to my attention that Dr. Shannon graduated from Gaylord High School. I immediately began to gather information so I could pass it on to the math and science students.

Tarbutton started each school year mentioning the students' predecessors. "I always ended it with, 'He was from Gaylord High School. If he did it, you can do it."

Many of his students have

succeeded: Dr. Brooks Madsen chemistry; Harry Lange, mathe-matics, investor; Dr. Nancy Elgas, biology research; Dr. Jimmy Madagame, medical, and Dr. Harry Glidden, chemistry, just to name a few

"I used to stay after school with him until 7 or 8 in the evening," Tarbutton said of Glidden, often not even understanding what he was doing. "He went on to get his doctorate. Right now he's one of the leaders in the country in plastics."

Dr. Madagame, now living in Chicago, still calls Tarbutton.

"HE CALLS ME once in a while to go out and have a steak dinner with him," he said, then remembers back to the days he had him as a student, an athlete who never neglected his studies staying up until 3 a.m. to finish homework. "We had to figure out ways to get him from studying so

"In our own community there are doctors, lawyers, city police officers, state police, members of the sheriff's department, coaches, teachers, servicemen, nurses, business people, engineers, veterinarians ... All of these students were introduced to Dr. Shannon

Tarbutton got the chance to meet his idle in 1986 when Dr. Shannon returned to Gaylord High School looking for nothing more than his 1932 graduation picture. It was an exercise in humility.

"(He) left the school somewhat disappointed and upset and would fly out the next day," said Tarbutton. Tarbutton convinced Dr. Shannon to return to the high school the next day to be inducted as an honorary member into the high school National Honor Society. Literally pinning him outside, Tarbutton encouraged him to visit his classroom where the graduation picture hung. That led to an introduction to the math teaching staff and finally a brief speech given at graduation.

"AFTER MEETING Dr.

Shannon I tried over the years to have a bust and plaque placed in the high school in his honor," Tarbutton related. "I was never successful. Not being able to be sure that a memory of Dr. Shan-non would remain in our school was and continues to be a sad memory for me."

He remains pleased with the park and the statue downtown.

Tarbutton's work with his students recalls another trick he used to spread Dr. Shannon's fame. Math and science movies the school used to rent occasionally featured Shannon, Before Tarbutton returned them, know

ing they would circulate among other northern Michigan schools, he dropped a note into them reminding the next viewer where the star of the film was from

was born April 30, 1916 in Petoskey. His childhood hero was Thomas Edison. He got his first job with Western Union as a

messenger boy.

• Shannon earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Michigan in 1936; his master's


and his PhD. from MIT in 1940.

• Favorite author, T.S. Elliot; favorite food, vanilla ice cream with chocolate sauce

 Among his awards are the National Medal of Science from President Johnson; recognition by Life magazine as the master of mathematics
• Inventor of the "Information

Theory," the basis for the design and study of telephone and com-puter systems. His master's thesis has been called "possibly the most important master's thesis of the century."

an unexpected appearance at the International Information Theory Symposium in Brighton, England. The chairman said of him, "It was as if Newton showed up at a,physics conference." Tarbut-ton reported, "He took out three balls and started to juggle. He amazed the audience with his
