

Did you know the town of Waters had a band? The Waters Coronet Band was organized in 1881. Thankfully someone wrote down the names of the musicians.

The Gaylord City Band was also organized in 1881. W. H. Cooper was the drum major. Other charter members include Will Carpenter, Orrin Bolton, Richard Harding, John Brodie, Sam Sellers, Freem Wells, C. S. Dodge, Myron Fuller, Daniel Hutchins, Stephen Humphrey, Charles Carpenter, George W. Smith, Elmer Hale, Dexter K. Mitchell, Forrest Humphrey, Elmer Carpenter, Sanford Buck, and Elmer Humphrey.

The octagon shaped bandstand was located on the courthouse lawn where summer concerts were presented. The band played in parades, at baseball games, and special events. They also were a regular on Mackinac Island.

When Gary Waldo was hired as the high school band teacher in 1963, his job also included City Band concerts during the summer. Funding dried up a few years later resulting in a silence of the music. The County's centennial in 1975 brought about a return of the summer concerts. The following year, the Gaylord Community Band was established with Ralph Schweigert as conductor. The group is currently under the direction of Aaron Hotelling.
