

## GLEN CATT


Born December 18, 1925, Glen, his brother Keith and his parents, Orrie and Rula lived in the small town of Freeport, just north of Kalamazoo. At the time, his Dad worked for the contractors who were building the new 131 highway toward the north. So, during his pre-school years Glen and his family lived in many towns as they progressed north with his Dad's work. Finally, in 1930 Orrie's work on 131 came to a halt at the Rapid River just north of Kalkaska. The contractor he was working for went bankrupt while attempting to complete the fill-in and new road grade level project at the river. That's how Glen and his family settled in Kalkaska. Glen started school there in the first grade.



Glen enlisted in the Army and was sworn in, in December of 1943. He was on a delayed entry program so he could finish high school. Thus, he went into the service in April of 1944 and was stationed at Wichita Falls, Texas for both Basic Training and Advanced Basic Training. He was then sent to Gunman School at Kingsman, Texas with the Army Air Corps. During his year there, he became a Gunnery Instructor for the turrent mounted 50 caliber machine guns which were used on the B24 Liberator and B17 Flying Fortress Bombers. His unit was the 397th Bomb Squadron which was shipped out for duty in the Canal Zone. The 397th had seven crews rotating in missions which flew out into the Pacific to check the identification of ships headed for the Canal Zone. Glen's job was cameraman and lower turrent gunman on the B17 and cameraman and tail-gunner on the B24. He was discharged April 2, 1946.

Upon returning to Krogers in Kalkaska, Glen was told that if he wanted to work he'd have to join the union. Glen told his Manager that he refused to join the union. His Manager responded with, "But you have to if you want to work." Glen replied, "I don't have to work here!" So they brought him back in a Student Manager classification and the Manager part of the classification kept him from having to join the union. In the fall of 1946 he was transferred to the Kroger store in Paw Paw where he progressed in his responsibility to Store Manager. He continued working with Krogers until late in 1950 when he went to work as a Store Manager for Mr. Mel Harding, owner of Harding's Market (a Spartan Store) in Parchment, Michigan. Glen continued working for Harding's for about fifteen months.

As Glen gained experience, he kept thinking to himself, "Here I am doing the work for somebody else, just like it was my own business. If I can do it for somebody else, I should be able to do it for myself!" And so he started looking for used equipment and a location. As Manager of Harding's in Parchment, Glen had earned the respect of the people in the area, many of which were tulip growers. At one time the growers had owned and operated their own grocery store, but their expertise was really as growers. As Glen said, "They liked me, and therefore, I was able to buy their used equipment. The original location for my store was to have been in my hometown of Kalkaska. My folks had always taught me to be honest and to fulfill my promises, and as a result I believed in people." The Kalkaska location didn't work out which left Glen with equipment which was supposed to be delivered in a week and no store to put it in. So, he started searching for a store in the surrounding northern communities. He had visited Gaylord in the past and liked the town. And so it was that Glen found a little market in Gaylord which had been closed for six months to a year.

With five weeks of a lot of cleaning, painting and the installation of the equipment he'd purchased from the tulip growers, Glen opened his first store on June 7, 1951. He started off with two full-timers and three part-timers. Mom (Rula) and Pop (Orrie) Catt had helped out getting the store ready to open and afterwards. In the spring of 1951, they moved to Gaylord with Mom using her cashier experience from Krogers and Pop working all over the store and fixing and making things.





Prior to opening, Glen had asked Spartan Stores to be his supplier, but at the time they didn't make any deliveries east of 131, so he started off with a smaller grocery wholesaler. In 1953, after two years in business, Glen packed his suitcase and headed for Grand Rapids. He said, "I'm not coming back until Spartan Stores accepts me as a Member." His determination had paid off. He came back as a member of Spartan Stores and as the relationship grew and prospered, Glen was elected to the Board of Directors in 1958, an honor which was to last for twenty-eight years. During those years Glen was Chairman of the Board from 1969 to 72 and from 1973 to 74, along with having held other offices on the Board.

In many ways Glen's life reads like a story book in which an enthusiastic young man who dreamed of owning a supermarket, saw that dream come true through hard work and sacrifice. Glen's vision and commitment has made possible the dreams of others to come true as well. Thirty-seven years after the opening of his first store, Glen's Market has developed into a strong chain of seventeen locations in northern Michigan and the Upper Peninsula. Today, Glen's family of Associates numbers over 1400 super people.


Glen attributes his thirty-seven years of success to all of his friends, the super people he's had a chance to work and associate with in the retail, wholesale and banking arenas and especially "Our Own Associates" and the "People of Spartan Stores." His feelings are, "They're the greatest people in the world! You can measure the success of retailers by their level of service, and that includes our own stores as well. By service, I mean the whole atmosphere of the store, including the quality of the products, the fairness in pricing, the overall cleanliness, and the teamwork in courteous, friendly and caring customer service, always keeping in mind that our customer is the person who pays our wages! I tell them, we just try and select the right people to start with. You need to try and put yourself in their position by treating them fair and honest, and when the chips are down, try and stick with them."

Glen has always been known to be fair, friendly and honest. We have been so fortunate to have worked with him, and each of us will forever be indebted to him for having had the opportunity to be a part of his dream.

Glen and his wife Barb thoroughly enjoy golf which will take up much of their leisure time both here and at their retirement home in Naples, Florida. They both enjoy traveling and have already shared some great trips together. Their family includes five children and fourteen grandchildren.

Glen, we all wish you well in your retirement and pray that you and Barb enjoy many wonderful years together. You will be sincerely missed and thought of as we each pursue our dreams in the future. We especially thank you for your friendship, your leadership and for being "A Man of Integrity."






