Cornelius Lewis

Interviewed along with Sam Underhill and Bama J. Rowen for the program "Those Who Served"
Born July 9, 1924, active in nay from 1/1942 to 10/1945, BM/3C rank
Served on Liberty ships in the Armed Guard branch of the Navy during World War 2
Liberty ships were cargo ships built on the West Coast in thirty days

Enlistment

Born and raised in Vanderbilt
Registered for the draft and signed up for the navy because he didn't like marching in the army
Signed up in Alpena then immediately sent down to Detroit
Shipped off to Chicago for gunnery training at the Great Lakes Naval Center
Unassigned in boot camp, so he volunteered for the Armed Guard when asked
Armed Guard only active in both World Wars to help guard convoys
First assignment was on a 28 ship convoy from New Orleans to New York
Close call on 2nd trip from New York to Casablanca (42 ship convoy was the largest he was in)

Ships were going into port single file because of the port design. Cornelius standing at the bow when the ammo ship next to his exploded. The torpedo went under his ship's fantail and hit the ammo ship by accident. The convoy left port in a zigzag pattern, while the escort ships screened out and caught the submarine with a depth charge.

Armed Guard could do nothing against submarines unless they surfaced Went next to England, V2 missile exploded nearby while docked He kept some shrapnel from it as souvenirs after the war Next traveled from England to the Persian Gulf Was in hospital (he didn't say why) when A-Bomb dropped

Life Aboard

Good food aboard the ships, steak and fresh produce were highlights

One ship had a hotel chef aboard as the head cook so everyone ate well

Duty entailed 4 hours on, 8 hours off in peaceful areas and 4 hours on, 4 hours off in dangerous areas

His position as petty officer gave him the midnight to 4 a.m. shift

Atlantic storms often created waves that rose above the ship

Thankful that he had wool socks for the cold nights

Destinations kept secret from the crew to prevent information slipping

Gambling a popular pastime abroad the ship

Later Life

Used the GI Bill to go to college after the war
Studied hormonal agriculture then worked at customs in ports of entries inspecting incoming produce
In Puerto Rico for 2 years, Baltimore, Maryland for 7 years and Toledo, Ohio for 17 years

Proud to have served in the Navy, meant something special to him
