SANFORD W BUCK, BANKER AND PIONEER RESIDENT, DIED MONDAY

One of County's Foremost Citizens Answered Last Call on Monday Afternoon
Was 69 Years of Age
 Actively Identified with Affairs of Otsego County for Forty-Six Years

Sanford W. Buck, for thirty years cashier of the Gaylord State Savings Bank, and one of the most prominent and beloved men of Otsego county, died Monday afternoon at his home in this city. The cause of death was cancer of the liver.

Although not entirely unexpected by close friends of the family, the announcement of his death was a great shock to the entire community which knew and loved him so well and of which he had been a friend and financial counselor for a third of a century.

The news of his death was quickly flashed about the city. Mr. Buck was a great man of the community which worked indefatigably. He was chairman of the Liberty Loan drives, and was active in the Red Cross drive. In every drive which he led the quota was over-subscribed, a tribute to his ability to work with men and to his loyalty to the cause.

In his capacity as a banker, Mr. Buck was the financial confidant of hundreds of families. They looked to him for their problems, and he always listened with interest and sympathy, and if possible extended the desired aid. The friends of the community were his patrons and his clients, and they probably worked hard to earn their money as he would have done. Although he had the banker's conservative viewpoint, he was nevertheless safely progressive. He was a good banker in all respects.
